



SUPERINTENDENT'S LETTER



It was a wonderful thing to schedule the Kids & Camelids Show one time in 2023 and have the weather cooperate. No rescheduling needed this year as we did last year: One and Done! We were blessed with a warm, but not hot, sunny day on Saturday April 22nd. And due to all the rain throughout the winter, the pastures and arena of Mares' Nest in Wilton, California, were green and lush.

We had a full contingent of kids arrive: 7 Juniors, 5 Intermediates, and 2 Seniors and a variety of friends, along with their llamas and alpacas.

As always, this particular event was half show, half clinic: a shownic! Extra care, more detail, and helpful hints are shared during the walk-throughs. When an unruly camelid posed a problem, an adult helper might step in to help calm and guide the animal. And lastly, the judge spent time with each of the participants upon completing the course so that the experience was fresh. This show hopes to be a learning experience so the next time out, the handler and animal are better prepared and more strategic at approaching and navigating obstacles.

Hoping to make to make the event even more appealing to youth handlers, each participant could invite a friend, and that friend was allowed to tackle the obstacle course, once the event is over, with the showing friend leading the way with his or her animal.

This year, we tried some new ideas:

First, Kathy designed a fabulous art station. Youth chose a pre-printed silhouette of an alpaca or a llama, and glued pre-cut strips (cut from colored pages of magazines and calendars) on the back side, covering the outline of the animal shape chosen. Once the strips were in place, Mod Podge was painted over the strips, and the papers were hung from clothes lines (bailing twine) and allowed to dry. Last step in the process was to cut out the shape using the original outline, and voila!! Camelid Modern Art!

Second, we offered a showmanship station. Although we did not have the event itself, this "clinic" was designed to prepare potential State Fair participants for the opportunity come July. In the front yard of Kathy's house, where the veteran trees provided shade, the youth circled with their animals, reversed and haunch turned, hearing the continual refrain of: "Smile, you are having the time of your life and you have the most outstanding animal in the world at the end of your lead line." During the portion of the clinic when participants were standing in line, side by side, facing the

judge and figuring out quadrants, the second most heard mantra was: "TOES! Where are your toes pointing? Toward the shoulder of your animal, please!!" And through the paces of showmanship we went.

A return station, the thank you card table, allowed youth participants to write thank you notes to the many adults who made the show possible. Crayons, felt pens, alphabet stickers, prepared thank you notes and blank notecards were provided. There was creative use of all of these in the finished products. Artistic renderings of hotdogs trended as the most popular theme! Those mailed notes were much appreciated by their recipients.



The adults responsible for the show deemed it a screaming success. The kids left smiling with stuffed camelids, camelid-themed journals and stickers, and a variety of camelid fun stuff. The adults were pleased and shared lots and lots of thank you's and offers to help clean up. It was yet another demonstration of that old adage: It takes a village. Many hands went into this event, and as the show superintendent, I am very, very thankful to those who helped, those who ensured that their children could participate, those who learned new things and who are inspired to go home and work with their kids and camelids.

Kathy Nichols: She had the lion share of the duty this year. She hosted the event (which means prep and clean up), she designed the obstacle courses and hauled all the obstacles into place so that all three courses were set up before the kids arrived. She found and prepared for a wonderful art activity for participants as they created mosaic-stripped silhouettes of either llamas or alpacas. She set up and loaded the Hospitality Table with morning refreshments and much appreciated coffee. And she loaned out her beloved Billy the Kid to youth who were experiencing a show for the first time. And he was a sweetheart.



Margaret Drew: She was on her feet all day as the judge and mentor. After scoring each participant's run through a course, she conferred with kids to highlight their successes and suggest tips to improve performance. She volunteered her time and donated her travel expenses.





Joy Pedroni: She received all the show paperwork in advance for the event, making sure to email each family as to what she had received. She (wo)manned the scoring table and completed tabulations to make ribbon announcements.

Stephanie Pedroni: She stepped in this year as the official photographer. With cell phone in hand, she captured wonderful photos of participants and their friends as they navigated the courses and participated in the showmanship clinic, art station, and thank you card table.





Robin and Emily Muirhead: As a mother-daughter team, they tackled the thank you card table, assisting youth in writing and in some cases designing thank you's for the folks listed here. They also set up the prize table dash between each event.

Fred Rich: He planned the lunch menu, shopped for all the necessary supplies, and prepared a huge pot of chili beans for the show's participants and families. He volunteered his time and donated the supplies.





Scott Kuykendall: He stepped in as assistant chef and chief hot dog barbecuer. He also proved invaluable in regard to breaking down tables and schlepping supplies back to trucks and trailers.






Mandatory

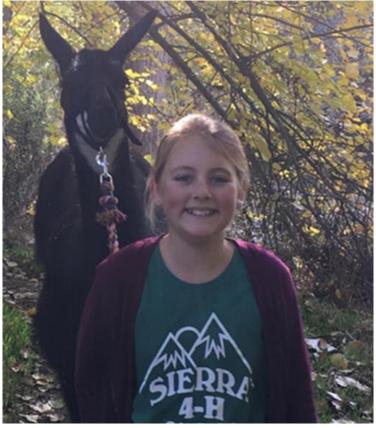


























Minimum Standards of Care for Llamas and Alpacas

Minimum Standards of Care are mandatory to Ilama and alpaca survival and humane treatment. These are the most basic requirements that all Ilamas and alpacas must have for physical well-being and, as such, define minimum requirements for animal control officers and government officials investigating questionable Ilama and alpaca care situations.

1. **WATER**: Animals should have continuous access to potable drinking water.

2. NUTRITIONAL: Animals should have nourishment adequate to sustain life and health.

3. **SHELTER**: Animals should have natural or man-made shelter that enables them to find relief from extreme weather conditions. The sheltered area must allow for the ability to stand, lie down, rest and reasonably move about.

4. **MOBILITY**: Animals should have a living area through which they can move freely and exercise independently

5. **NEGLECT**: Animals should have a physical appearance free from signs of serious neglect. Signs of serious neglect may include such things as crippled ambulation due to severely curled toenails, ingrown halters, or living conditions not meeting the minimums listed above.

6. **SAFETY**: Animals should be reasonably safeguarded from injury or death within their defined living environment and/or when traveling.

7. **CRUELTY**: Animals should be reasonably safeguarded from cruel treatment and actions that endanger life or health or cause avoidable suffering.

8. **SOCIALIZING**: Llamas and alpacas are herd animals and should not live alone without a companion animal. A cria (a baby llama or alpaca under six months) should not be apart from other llamas or alpacas.

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
